

Timothy H. Edgar is the Deputy for Civil Liberties in Civil Liberties and Privacy Office of the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, which was established by the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004.

Mr. Edgar came to the ODNI in June 2006 after five years as a national security policy and legislative counsel at the American Civil Liberties Union. Mr. Edgar testified on behalf of the ACLU before Congressional intelligence and judiciary committees and appeared in major national media. Mr. Edgar also spearheaded the organization's lobby efforts in a number of post-9/11 initiatives, including intelligence reform. Mr. Edgar was named "pro bono attorney of the year" by the Arab-American Anti-Discrimination Committee in 2002.

Prior to joining the ACLU in May 2001, Mr. Edgar was an attorney at the Washington law firm of Shea & Gardner. From 1997 to 1998, Mr. Edgar was a law clerk to Judge Sandra L. Lynch of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit in Boston. He is a 1997 magna cum laude graduate of the Harvard Law School, where he served as an editor on the Harvard Law Review. Mr. Edgar graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth College in 1994
